Rod Haney, our CIDA manager, spoke about his recent trip to India where he visited two Sahakarini projects among others. He reported enthusiastically about the range of activities and the dedication of our partners, at the same time reminding us of the importance of our role in building the capacity and independence of our partners.

He also told about the work of other NGOs they visited and particularly highlighted the work of MYRADA, a major Indian NGO that has shifted much of its work from projects to training, thus helping to build the capacity of local groups and organizations to help themselves. Our partner SERVE has taken advantage of some of their training programs.

"Human development," Haney noted, "is all encompassing. It is not just economic. It is about creating the environment for people to realize their full potential so that they can live productive and creative lives they value. NGOs in India play a significant role in reducing poverty and fostering change," he observed. "Even state governments are realizing that they can work better through NGOs than through their own bureaucracies."

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## Fire and Water in Guatemala

Phase one of the fire and water project to install 50 safe, efficient cook stoves and 50 water purification filters for villagers in rural Guatemala is now complete. Preparation is underway for completing the project with the remaining 50 stoves and filters.

The stoves are proving very successful. They are raised, fuel efficient, ventilated and easy to assemble, use and maintain. Each of these features is important. But rather than explaining their benefits, see what the women who have received them have to say. (Thank you to Alice Lindstrand for help with translation. Paraphrasing is editor's.)

**Estella:** I am so happy about this stove. I do not have to breathe smoke every time I cook and I won't burn the hair on my arms. I do not need to cut so much firewood. Thank you for bringing me something so useful with so many advantages.

**Alida:** ...much less danger of our children getting burned and they are much healthier

**Vilma:** I am so happy that this stove is so easy to put together and to maintain. Being a woman, I like to change things around and it is easy to move. With this stove, my eyes do not sting, I do not have to rinse the soot off my dishes all the time, we do not need to cut so many trees, and we do not get burned.

**Irma:** The stoves are very useful for this community. I hope that all the women use them so we can get more and help other women because they are really good. They save wood, and we won't get sick or burn ourselves.

## Kristen's Diary

*Below are excerpts from notes made by Kristen Cumming who visited India this summer. Kristen does some contract work for Sahakarini so was able to arrange to speak with some of the beneficiaries of the HOPE*

*and Change Project outside Hyderabad.*

We visited Midhani slum, the residents of which are largely (anecdotally 90%) gypsy and have migrated from drought-prone agricultural regions where employment is scarce. The literacy level within the slum is below 5%.

The 2008 monsoon was very late and agricultural work is therefore delayed, placing considerable pressure on families that intended to migrate back to rural employment.

I spoke with **Mrs. Sona**, a beautiful, shy and petite 26-year old woman who had been recently widowed and cares for her four daughters by working as a manual labourer on a construction site.

She participates in non-formal basic education in the evening and is hoping to attend the sewing program eventually. Two of her daughters attend the HOPE school. She has availed herself of the crèche program and of medical care provided by SERVE. She has ambitious goals for her children and wants to educate her daughters so that they will not have to work as manual labourers, and so that they can celebrate successful marriages.

I spoke with **Mrs. Narasamma**, whose beautiful smile lit up the room. Mrs. Narasamma works as a labourer at a vegetable market. She is attending non-formal basic education and is a member of the self-help group. She reports that the group is very helpful in discussing issues important to families and within the slums. She has one son attending HOPE school and relies on the medical care provided by SERVE. When asked about the most pressing issues in the slum, she reports that sanitation, abstinence and education of girl

children are her priorities.

We proceeded to the driving school and spoke with two students and a trainer. There is considerable demand for drivers and graduates can expect to earn 4000 rupees per month (about \$100) during probation and between 5000 and 6000 rupees after probation.

On a brief visit of the plumbing school we learned that graduates are government certified and eligible to earn approximately 6000 rupees (\$150) per month.

We concluded our visit at Leninagar where we toured the HOPE School and visited health worker trainees. Brief discussion with Jhansy Paul yielded some very promising information about Health Worker trainee's employment prospects. Jhansy indicated that of the 39 students in the First Batch of training, all had received government employment. Of the 39 students in Second Batch, 20 had received contract employment and 19 received private sector employment. She reported that several employers were contacting the school to hire graduates, and those students were reporting earnings at 5000 rupees per month in contract positions, and 7000 rupees per month in government positions.

## The School Called HOPE

School is in for another year for 350 children in the slums of Hyderabad in south central India. Hope is strong that they will gain the knowledge base needed to break the cycle of poverty.

"It is hard to imagine the poverty and discrimination these people face when we have so much freedom and material wealth," said Gail Stolee, executive director of Sahakarini. "We could not walk away from 350 kids who truly want and need to learn. Some changes just take time. But the impacts are life long."

A wonderful group of volunteers has come forward to spearhead the support effort. One of the committee members, Linda Dey, visited the school in 2005. She recalls that "The children are wonderful, but they are so poor. They were really proud to be going to school. I believe that education is their hope, is the way out for them."

We will be looking for opportunities to link the school with organizations here and in India that might have an interest as well as individuals who want to help give these children that chance.

Sahakarini first supported the school in 2004 when there were fewer than 200 students. It has continued to grow as partner organization SERVE works with families to encourage them to send their children. In a community where the education of girls is often not a priority, they are especially heartened that 47% of the students are girls. Educating girls means that you are educating families for the future.

In addition to academics (K-7 at this time) the children receive a hot meal, school supplies, and regular medical attention. Their parents report that the

children's behaviour also improves greatly once they go to school.

In a new initiative, the committee will be approaching a number of businesses to encourage them to make Christmas gifts to the school as gifts to their clients. ### Here are just a few ideas for how you might help.

- Sponsor the opportunity for one child to attend for a year . . . . . \$200

- Hire a teacher . . . . . \$1,500
- Provide uniforms for all the children . . . . . \$4,500

### If you like the idea of monthly gifts using post-dated cheques, you could

- Provide books for ten children; or uniforms for seven; or a hot lunch for one . . . . . \$10/month
- Provide all the sports equipment; or pay the rent for one month; or transport nine children for a year . . . . . \$25/month
- Provide uniforms for 40 children, or books for 60 children . . . . . \$50/month
- Hire a teacher for the year . . . . . \$125/month
